The undersigned is directed to say that a question has arisen whether Govt. servants may study short-hand and typewriting, in institutions teaching these subjects, outside office hours. Government have decided that Government servants may do so with the prior permission of the Head of the office.

2. The grant of permission to Government servants to attend law classes will continue to be regulated by the instructions contained in Mr. T. C. Puri's letter no. A-727 dated the 21st January, 1952.

Subject-Prohibition of Government servants from attending law classes.

The undersigned is directed to invite a reference to Shri T. C. Puri's circular letter no. A-227, dated the 21st January 1952, on the subject mentioned above (copy enclosed) and to say that in Appointment Department Memo. No. III/R1 2043/59A-13597, dated the 27th October 1959, while the policy in permitting Government servants to attend classes in a college or any other educational institution was liberalised, the restrictions about law classes contained in Shri Puri's letter mentioned above, were retained. Government have now decided that the restriction in attending law classes should also be removed and permission granted to Government servants according to the instructions contained in Appointment Department Memo. No. 13597, dated the 27th October, 1959.

SUBJECT:—Prohibition of Government servants from attending Law Classes.

I am directed to say that Government have noticed an increasing tendency on the part of Government servants towards joining Law classes and then resigning their posts on successfully passing their Law examinations. It seems that a practice is growing of persons seeking Government service not with the idea of making Government service a career but in order to find an income for preparation for a career at the Bar. Such Government servants have no inducement to learn their work and to become useful public servants looking for promotion in the offices which they have joined. On the other hand their appointment followed by resignation dislocates work which is prejudicial to the public interest. To discourage this practice Government had in Government Order no. 1661. C., dated the 16th December, 1925 (copy enclosed) laid down that no person joining Government service should be allowed to attend Law Classes at Patna without the special Permission of Government and the Heads of Offices at Patna were directed to ensure that these orders were strictly enforced. These orders were subsequently reiterated in Government Order no. 3663, dated the 3rd April 1949 (copy enclosed).

2. At the time when the above orders issued there was only one Law College in Bihar located at Patna. Since then a Law College has been established at Muzaffarpur, and Law classes are being held in the Colleges at Darbhanga and Gaya. In course of time more Law Colleges may be established at other places in the State. As the principle underlying the prohibition of Government servants from attending Law Classes is to promote efficiency and prevent dislocation of work in Government offices Government consider it desirable that the orders referred to above should apply to all Government employees in the State and should be deemed to extend to all places in the State wherever Law Colleges exist or may be setup in future. I am accordingly to request that the orders may be strictly enforced and in future persons attending Law classes should not be allowed to continue their Law studies after appointment to Government service without the special permission of Government in the administrative Department. A Government servant can be allowed to study law on the consideration that such study would increase his efficiency in the particular duties which he is required to perform in the post held by him. Cases of Government servants who are attending Law classes should be reviewed by each Department from this point of view to see whether they should be allowed to continue to attend such classes.

2. These orders may be brought to the notice of all officers who have not been informed direct (and the Principals of Law Colleges in the State).

Copy of Government order no. 1661-C, dated Ranchi, the 16 th December 1925, from the Government of Bihar and Orissa, Political Department (Special Section).

The attention of Government has been drawn to the fact that no less than 35 officers stationed at Patna in recent years have taken there Law Classes and resigned their appointments on successfully passing the law examinations. It is clear that a practice is growing up of seeking Government appointments, not with the idea of serving Government, but in order to draw pay from Government for the period of preparation for a career at the Bar, Such a practice can only be prejudicial to the interests of Government. Persons attending the Law classes, although their whole time is supposed to be at the disposal of Government have no inducement to learn their work and no intention of qualifying themselves to be useful public servants. They are not looking for promotion in the offices which they have joined and their appointment and resignation only serves to dislocate work.

It has, therefore, been decided that no person joining Government service in the future will be allowed to attend the Law classes at Patna without the special permission of Government, and it will be the duty of the Heads of the Offices in Patna to see that these orders are strictly enforced.

Copy of Government order no, 3663-A, dated Patna, the 3rd April 1949, from the Under-Secretary to the Government of Bihar, Appointment Department, to all Departments of the Secretariat and Heads of Departments at Patna.

I am directed to invite your attention to Government order no, 1661-C, dated the 16th December 1925 (copy enclosed) and to say that Government have reasons to believe that the order is not being strictly enforced.

I am, therefore, to request that the order referred to above should be strictly enforced and in future no person should be appointed to the Departments of the Secretariat and the offices of the Heads of Departments at Patna who is attending Law classes.

Cases of existing assistants who are attending Law classes should be reviewed by each Department to see whether they should be allowed to continue to attend such classes.

### Part XVII— PROMOTION.

Subject :— Promotion of Ministerial Officers to Gazetted posts.

The undersigned is directed to say that the State Government have carefully considered the recommendation of the Bihar Pay Revision Committee regarding promotion of the Ministerial officers to gazetted posts and have accepted the principle that suitable ministerial officers should be promoted to certain categories of the gazetted services and posts. They have accordingly been pleased to decide as follows :—

#### 2. (i) Promotion to Subordinate Civil Service.

Suitable ministerial officers serving in any office under the State Government should be eligible for promotion to the Subordinate Civil Service. The Board of Revenue Bihar will as at present invite recommendation for such promotion from the Departments of Government. The Selection Board will be free to confine its choice to such of the ministerial officers recommended as would appear to them to be fit in every respect to perform all the duties which the members of the Subordinates Civil Service are required to perform. The educational qualifications required for such candidates will be the same as laid down in the relevant rules of the Subordinate Civil Service (Recruitment) Rules.

#### (ii) Promotion to Bihar Finance Service.

Recommendations of the Ministerial Officers to the Bihar Finance Service (Junior Branch) will continue to be made as at present under Rule 15 of Part V. of the Bihar Finance Service Rules, 1947.
